

# Listening In....

● Inauguration of Dwight D. Eisenhower as the 34th President of the United States next Tuesday will be presented over the WENE radio network by the American Broadcasting Company and in the Southern Tier over WENE.

Starting at 11:30 a. m. the inaugural itself and the colorful ceremonies attendant upon it will be heard over WENE and the ABC radio network up to 4:30 p. m. Describing the historic event in all its aspects will be a team of the crack reporters who made broadcast history in ABC's coverage of the national political conventions in July and the Presidential election in November.



Heading the inaugural coverage staff for WENE and ABC will be Walter Winchell, American No. 1 reporter, and John Daly, whose brilliant reports of the convention and election added lustre to a program already famous in radio circles. Other staff members will be: Bob Dwyer, who will be in charge of the color commentary; Hal Graves, who will be in charge of the color commentary; and Betty Crocker, who will be in charge of the color commentary.

The entire presentation will be brought to you through WENE-TV and WENE-Motors Inc.

Because of the inauguration the following program changes will take effect Tuesday, January 20, only:

The local news usually heard at 12:30, will be broadcast at 4:30 — the 12:40 weathercast will come to you at 4:35 p. m. Hal Graves with Tello-Tell, usually heard daily at 12:45, will be presented at 4:40. Betty Crocker's usual 4:25 show will be heard at 4:35 instead—Piccino's news, a daily 1 p. m. feature, will be aired at 5 o'clock—Radio Want Ads will come to you at 6:50 p. m. instead of the usual in the regular 1:45 time slot.

The opera "Madame Butterfly" will be heard over WENE-ABC from the stage of the famous Metropolitan Opera House in New York at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. . . . The final of two church services from Endwell Methodist Church will be aired over WENE Sunday morning at 11. The Rev. Samuel Little will officiate. How long does it take you to earn \$10,000? Actress Bette Davis will get ten-grand for an eight minute stint on the Arthur Murray television show next month. There ain't no justice! . . . We hear one of the most dazzling stage reviews ever to hit the Radio City Music Hall. Its known as "Dancing Waters. Some 4,000 water jets have been set up on the huge stage to blend with baller music, colorful lighting and the dancing Rockettes. RCA has just come out with a new three-speed album known as "From FDR to Eisenhower." It features the voices of prominent personages who made history from 1945 to the present era.
